Don't let Ponticum hysteria get to you. Denser planting reduces the area available for weeds. Transplanting frequently, when plants are manageable, allows one to have the healthiest plant, in the ideal location. Layering is my favorite propagation technique, 100% success with minimal care. Why don't the growers cultivate and sell the rhododendrons that win the ribbons during truss shows?
