## Exbury Garden: Past and Present

It is just over 100 years since Lionel de Rothschild started work on one of the best-known woodland gardens in the world, one devoted above all to his favourite plant, the rhododendron. In just twenty years he created one of the largest gardens of its kind, as well as funding a number of the plant hunters of the day and creating many beautiful hybrids.

His work was continued by his sons and is now looked after by the two generations after that. His grandson, Lionel, will talk about the history and about the plants in this iconic garden.



Lionel de Rothschild is the grandson and namesake of the creator of Exbury Gardens. He has written and lectured on Exbury Garden, rhododendrons, and other Rothschild gardens. He is also a trustee of The Rothschild Archive in London and sits on the Garden Council of Borde Hill Gardens in West Sussex.



showcases the fascinating collections of rare plants, shrubs, and trees that remain on show today, as well as the famed rhododendrons, azaleas, magnolias, and camellias.

#### Saturday, April 30th at Beban Park Centennial Building 10am to 2pm

Our last event was in 2019, so we are so happy to be able to stage the Truss Show and Plant Sale once more. We are a little earlier this year (about 2 weeks) and so we may see a whole new set of trusses! It is exciting to be doing this again. If you have a beautiful rhododendron in your garden, blooming at the right time, think about entering, just one truss, or many. Come help us make it a showcase for rhododendrons.

There will be display tables available, so if you do not want to enter the competition and you have a favourite in your garden that is in glorious form, bloom or foliage, consider bringing it for the display only table to help make the show more appealing to the eye and to share the joy! Below, I would like to share with you a few photos from previous shows.



2018: The judges take their time and look seriously at each class. Glenda and Liz are showing the judges where each class can be found, following the judges to record the results and re-arranging the entries for better visibility when necessary.

There will be notes recorded from the judges where they have comments to make about a specific entry, e.g. in 2018 there was a truss which could have won a prize if the entrant had cleaned up the truss, removed dead pieces of sepal or other debris.

Hope to see you all on the weekend of the show, if you don't want to enter, come and enjoy the spectacle!

To enter involves gathering your entries the night before, filling in your entry forms in advance, turning up between 5:30pm and 8pm on Friday 10<sup>th</sup> to make your entry if at all possible, or around 7 am on the Saturday morning for those

who really can't make it because they live outside of Nanaimo. Club members will be available on arrival to help set up your entries, answer any questions....

Detailed instructions on how to enter are available on our website under Truss Show. There is a poster available for download on the website if you have somewhere you can display it, or hand it out. All help with advertising is very welcome.

#### Last minute instructions for entering Rhodo Trusses to the show on 30<sup>th</sup> April:

- 1. Be sure to read the Hints and Tips section below on picking your entries for the show, on preparing them for entry and on displaying your rhodo trusses to the best advantage.
- 2. Entries need to be received at the registration desk between 5:30 and 7:30 pm on Friday, April 29<sup>th</sup> if possible please. If you come from far and need to register on Saturday 30<sup>th</sup>, registration clerks will be available from 7:00am and the last entries will be accepted at the registration desk at 7:30 am; all entries arriving after that time will not be entered and will be displayed on the 'display only' table.
- 3. Please complete the two-part registration form (see below, pp.12-13):
  - a. Page 1 is a list of your entries with the class if at all possible please. (the clerk will retain this page)
  - b. Page 2 is a list of your entries <u>in exactly the same order</u> as on page 1 (this list is for you to keep track of your entries and to help transfer them to the show table) (You can find the 2-page registration form on the NRS Web site and also in the newsletter below. A list of rhodos by class can be found on the NRS web site 'Truss Show' section and if in doubt, help will be available at the registration desk to find the correct class for the entry).
- 4. At the registration desk, please put your entries in the water bottles provided and line them up on one of the tables adjacent to the desk, <u>in the order in which they appear on page 1 of the form</u>. Corks are available to help display your entries to advantage in the bottles.
- 5. Take your registration form to the desk. The registration clerk should return page 2 to you.
- 6. You will receive a card for each entry from the registration clerk which will have the name and class of the rhodo truss and an entry number on a small sticker.
- 7. Put each card into a wooden card-holder next to the correct entry, and with the help of a registration clerk, the entries will be transferred to the show display tables to the correct sections.
- 8. Good luck! 😊

If you have a particular rhodo truss or foliage, beautiful, a bit different that you think people might like to see - but not for entry to the show - please bring it for the 'display only' table.



*Oreotrephes* is an Elepidote Species.

Species are botanically identified plants originating from seed or cuttings.



'Black Widow', a 'red' hybrid was the PEOPLE'S CHOICE in 2019.

Hybrids are plants resulting from cross-breeding of more than one species, hybrid, or combination thereof.

#### **Tips on Exhibiting Trusses and Sprays**

A day or two before the show, go around and make a list of the blooms you will pick in the morning, the day before the show. Organize whatever containers you will be using to transport your blooms to the show - they needn't be elaborate - empty bottles or cans work well. Be careful to avoid crushing the blooms. Fill the containers with water almost to the top. Bottles in six-pack cartons are great for transporting blooms.

Picking blooms always takes more time than you think it will! When choosing trusses, select ones that have straight stems with the bloom at the top. Don't choose ones with crooked stems that are growing at odd angles (e.g. pointing straight down). When choosing sprays, look for ones that will present themselves gracefully in a bottle. Pieces of cork can be used to stabilize the stem in the neck of the bottle.

Prune judiciously, if need be, to enhance the shape of a spray. You can remove a damaged leaf or two, as long as you leave a set of leaves in good condition encircling the bloom. Remove additional leaves further down the stem. Avoid choosing entries with bruises. Sometimes rain damage is inevitable but avoid it if you can. Look for freshness.

In a spray, it is better to have one or more unopened flower buds (for they frequently open after they have been picked) than to choose blooms that are already open and going past their best. Some judges like to see one or two unopened or partially opened buds, but a truss must not have flowers from more than one bud (except for the hammerhead class). Hammerhead definition (Seattle) is "inflorescence with multiple rachis emanating from a single leaf stem".

### Plant of the Month by Ron Sutton

#### Azalea 'Nuccio's Purple Dragon'

Here is a floriferous eye-catching evergreen azalea that's a R. stenopetalum 'Linearifolium' hybrid. It is very similar to Azalea 'Koromo Shikibu'. The 3.5-inch long strap-like flowers are medium purple, often streaked with white. The leaves are medium green with fine hairs. It is hardy to 0°F and will grow to 4 feet wide by 3 feet high. It likes full sun, and was unaffected by the heat wave of 2021.





My plant in the photo above, was photographed May 3<sup>rd</sup>, and was just beginning to open. It was purchased from Whitney Gardens.

The photo on the left, taken May 30<sup>th</sup>, is a plant in full bloom. This is the one I had in Ontario, where it had to be wintered in the garage. It was purchased from Greer Gardens.

#### Rosina's April Gardening Calendar:

General: Apply beneficial nematodes to rhododendrons and the lawn;

Divide summer flowering perennials; plant new perennials;


Rake out moss from the lawn and seed it if necessary. Prune shrubs after flowering, including rhododendrons; fertilize with all-purpose 6-8-6. Place peony support rings before growth gets too tall. Apply slug bait around newly emerging Hostas. When apples and lilac bloom, plant squash, cucumber and beans; wait for Spireas to bloom to plant the tomatoes.

**Rhododendrons:** continue tip pruning the developing leaf buds and dead-heading the spent flowers; mulch with wood chips; fertilize after blooming.

**Mason Bees:** add additional nests, according to blossom presence. Plant early flowering plants that bloom when there are few flowers present.
