OUR FEBRUARY SPEAKER BOB DUNCAN

We have something a little different planned our meeting on Thursday, February 16th. Bob Duncan, a retired entomologist who lives in Sidney and grows citrus fruit in an unheated greenhouse, will be providing a presentation on "Pushing the Limits". Bob and his wife, Verna, have a business called Fruit Trees and More, propagating and selling over 300 varieties of fruit, from apples (over 200 varieties) to citrus, olives, pomegranates and jujubes. Basic information is available at fruittreesandmore.com. The Duncans will be selling plants, but if there is something specific you are interested in, I would encourage you to make contact ahead of time to ensure that they will bring it along to the meeting. This is an opportunity to prepare for global warming, and to learn how to situate sub-tropicals to give them the best chance to thrive in your garden. As the district representative of the BC Fruit Testers Association, I personally recognize Bob Duncan as one of the foremost resources on fruit growing in our region.
