Invasive Species in the Vancouver Island Garden - Identification, Management, and Removal

with Allison McCabe at Beban Park Social Center

Invasive Species in the Vancouver Island Garden - Identification,
Management, and Removal* with Allison McCabe BSc, MLWS, ATAg



Allison will discuss a range of invasive plants found commonly in Vancouver Island gardens: Himalayan blackberry, English ivy, and Spurge laurel (to name a few!). She will explain how to identify them and how to stop their spread by using species-specific removal techniques and responsible horticultural practices.

Based in Vancouver, Allison is the Senior Lead of outreach at the Invasive Species Council of BC. She works mainly with the PlantWise program, which aims to reduce the use of invasive ornamental plants in gardens and the retail industry.

She also teaches horticulture part-time at UBC and is an avid vegetable gardener in her spare time.


A look back at our January meeting:

Our speaker, Linda Derkach, gave us a presentation full of information on climate change and our gardens. She showed us that there are many things that we can do to make our gardens more resilient. We can still grow the plants we love, including our rhododendrons. However, we may need to make some changes to help our gardens deal with the instability of increasing extremes of our climate: heat domes, prolonged droughts, heavy rain and flooding, wind, and cold winter weather. As gardeners, we all have a role to play in limiting our water consumption through planting trees to create more shade and microclimates, mulching, planting “the right plant in the right place”, and the use of drought tolerant plants. We can choose plants and techniques that support pollinators, our bird populations, and beneficial insects.

Linda also talked about a new initiative known as “Homegrown National Parks,” which is a grassroots call-to-action to regenerate biodiversity and ecosystem function by planting native plants and creating new ecological networks. It is about the collective effort of individual homeowners like us to plant more native plants and remove more invasive plants. It is through the small efforts of the many that collectively we can make a huge difference. No one is asking you to remove all of your rhododendrons. 😊 This is about realizing that as gardeners and stewards of the land, we are connected to nature.






NRS Propagation Committee report – by Rosina Schmidt




NRS Library by June Bouchard

Plant of the Month by Ron Sutton


Rhododendron indicum balsaminiflora

This species azalea is from the mountains of Japan. It has shiny green lanceolate shaped leaves to 1.5 inches long. The double reddish orange flowers, 2-2.5 inches wide, bloom in late May.

It forms a dense shrub of 3 feet wide by 1.5 feet high in 10 years and is hardy to USDA zone 7 or -18°C It can handle full sun, but isn't drought tolerant.

I have been posting about plants I am currently growing, but this is one I used to have in my Ontario, USDA zone 6, garden. It was purchased from Greer Garden's mail order business. I had two of these plants, one in the garden and one in a pot. The one in the garden could handle the Ontario winter, but wouldn't flower. Harold Greer figured winter was too cold for it to form flowers. So, I ordered another one and kept it potted, and protected in the garage for the winter. It is the one in the photo, and as you can see, it did flower.

This plant is very difficult to find, and I am trying to reacquire one for my island garden.

Rare Companion Plants at Far Reaches Botanical Conservancy

A look at uncommon to very rare introductions in the FRBC collection which are suitable to accompany Rhododendrons in the woodland garden. Many of these were acquired on joint collecting trips with our good friend, whom you may have heard of, Steve Hootman. Kidding of course! There will be a bit of plant hunting in the wild as well as seeing how these are performing for us in the Far Reaches of Port Townsend, Washington.

Their bio...

Kelly and Sue have spent their lives learning and working with plants in nurseries, botanic gardens and on plant hunting expeditions. They are owners of Far Reaches Farm whose extensive collection of plants is spectacularly unfocused. The nursery has been featured in magazines such as Pacific Horticulture, Horticulture, Martha Stewart Living and in 2021, mentioned in the New York Times as “arguably the best nursery in the country for cool-climate perennials” and in Gardens Illustrated as “one of the best nurseries in the world.” In addition, they are contributing editors for Fine Gardening magazine. They are also founding directors of Far Reaches Botanical Conservancy, a non-profit whose mission is the acquisition and conservation of vulnerable plants of wild and cultivated origin that are new or rare in North America. Vancouver Island Master Gardeners Association “Spring Education Day” Vegetable Gardening, the Good, the Bad and the Ugly Saturday, March 11th at Nanoose Place

- The day will include a panel of VIMGA Master Gardeners from their four districts who will discuss vegetable gardening (with a Q & A to follow).
- There will also be a presentation from Bonnie Zand. Many of you will remember Bonnie from our “Fall into Gardening” event in October, where she gave an excellent presentation! Bonnie is the owner of Bonnie’s Bugs IPM, a private consulting company working with farmers to manage insect pests on Vancouver Island. She is currently running the Vancouver Island Pests, Pollinators and Beneficials Project.
- Bonnie holds a BSc in biology from UVic, is a board member of the Native Bee Society of BC and is part of the recovery implementation group for the endangered Taylor’s checkerspot butterfly. Bonnie is also the BC instructor for the Master Melittologist program. In her spare time, she likes to look for interesting native bees and other insects, raise mason bees, garden with native plants, and instill a love of plants in her five-year-old daughter.



February Gardening Calendar By Rosina Schmidt

Hello to the new gardening season. At Departure Bay at the time of this writing, the Hellebore buds are stretching their heads out of the mulch and so are the daffodils. It's a delightful time of expectation for our gardens to come back to life.



- **Rhodos:** sprinkle 10-6-4 granular fertilizers around your young plants and around those that could use some additional booster. Enjoy the very early trusses.
- **Orchard Bees:** Set nests outside. Refrigerate the cocoons until released.
- **General Gardening:** Prune fruit trees. Spray with dormant oil/lime sulphur spray. Spread lime around alkaline-loving plants such as clematis, lilacs, and peonies. Prune dormant trees, shrubs, and conifers. Treat hydrangeas with aluminum sulphate for bluer shades or lime for pink shades. Transplant dormant plants using liquid root booster. Plant extras into 1-gallon pots for NRS' May Plant Sale.
- Remember:
 - When **Forsythia** is blooming – plant radishes.
 - When the **apple trees and lilacs** are blooming, plant squash, cucumber, and beans.
 - Wait for planting the **tomatoes** until the Spireas are blooming.
