NANAIMO RHODODENDRON SOCIETY Minutes of Annual General Meeting - May 12, 2016


The Annual General Meeting of the Nanaimo Rhododendron Society commenced at 19:35 chaired by President, Chris Southwick with 37 people in attendance.

Allelopathy in Kalmias by Diana Walker

I read with interest the section on *Kalmia latifolia*; however, there is no mention in this particular article that Kalmias can be allelopathic in certain areas. I quote from the book "Kalmia Mountain Laurel and Related Species" by Richard A. Jaynes, as follows:

"Allelopathy is the growth inhibition of one plant by another. A long and well-known example is the growth inhibition effect of black walnut (*Juglans nigra*) trees on several plants, including tomatoes (Lycopersicon) and rhododendrons. In addition to their toxic foliage and honey, some members of the family Ericaceae are allelopathic. In particular, ericaceous species associated with heathland conditions seem to be responsible for slowing conifer regeneration and growth. In the boreal forests of North America, members of the genera Gaultheria, Kalmia, Ledum, and Vaccinium dominate cutover areas and poor-quality sites, with the aggressive northern sheep laurel (*Kalmia angustifolia* var. *angustifolia*) dominating extensive areas of eastern Canada and northern New England. Following disturbances such as logging and fire, sheep laurel spreads rapidly by rhizomes, impeding the successful regeneration of commercial softwood species, especially black spruce, *Picea mariana*. On these sites, black spruce as well as some other conifers have extremely low germination rates, and their seedlings exhibit nutrient deficiency symptoms and slow growth. This is a serious economic problem that has been intensively researched by Canadian foresters in an effort to develop sound ecological means to re-establish the black spruce stands (Titus et al. 1995).


In 1990 Louise de Montigny and Gordon Weetman reported that ericaceous plants, including sheep laurel, have been found to be associated with water-soluble phenolic compounds that are phytotoxic. These compounds hinder primary root development and prevent mycorrhizal inoculation of black spruce by destroying root epidermal and cortical cells. Sheep laurel is also more efficient than black spruce at accumulating soil nutrients, particularly nitrogen, and the leaves are slow to decay, increasing the amount of humus on a site. This increase in humus, the lack of nutrients, and the allelopathic effects of the phenolic compounds effectively slow regeneration of black spruce."



Rhododendron 'Winter Spice' — ('Hachmann's Charmant' x 'Dreamland') 5', -17°C, M, 4/4. A soft pink to white with an attractive twin red flare. Good foliage and nice habit.

Rhododendron spinuliferum — (*RN*, *rn*, *Scabrifolia*) 4',-20C This unusual species has terrific heavily veined or puckered leaves. The leaves are a great contrast to the lightly hairy undersides and hairy stems. The orange flowers are tubular with protruding stamens and style. Like a fistful of firecrackers these flowers are held upright in the truss. A very interesting plant, a conversation piece!
