One of my personal favourites at this time of year is the species *R. chamaethomsonii*. My plant is a Greig selected form of the species. It is now approximately eight feet wide and three feet tall. I purchased it in a Scotch pot at our NRS spring sale in 1997 from Peter Kearns a most knowledgeable and able grower from Cowichan at that time. *R. chamaethomsonii* has exquisite dark red tubular bell-shaped flowers with heavy substance in trusses of up to four. It is also a prolific bloomer and a very easy plant to grow. I hope to bring some examples of it to our next meeting unless the early morning frosts change my plans. Remember if you have plants blooming and they're big enough to cut a few branches, please bring some samples to our next general meeting on March 12th.

Speaking of both our Plant Sale and Truss shows and our next meeting, you must come to hear noted plantsman, Gordon MacKay our presenter for March. He is the owner of Alba Plants in Victoria and has been one of our vendors at our annual plant sales, including Sunday, May 3rd 2015



"Plant Hunters Georges Forest & Sherriff"



Our March Speaker

Gordon McKay is speaking on plant introductions of **George Forrest** and **George Sherriff**. Gordon will have some of the Alba Nursery Plants at the meeting.

Gordon was involved in landscaping as a teenager in a family business in Glasgow Scotland and developed a passion for ornamental plants when studying at the renowned Threave School of Gardening. After visiting Vancouver Island on a project, he settled here and has established Alba plants, a specialty plant nursery. He is part of the therapeutic horticulture team of Providence Farm and has recently taken a position as Horticulture Instructor at Camosun College.

Raffle Plants



Rhododendron schlippenbachii — 4', -31°C, E-EM, 4/3-4. A deciduous species loved by all who see it. It's upright and open with thinly textured leaves in whorls of

5 at each stem tip and it shows off its star-like, delicate pink flowers either just before or along with the leaves. The distinctive, thin foliage will not tolerate excessive sun exposure. The obviate dark green leaves turn crimson, orange or yellow in autumn. For added interest, flowers sometimes are tinged with reddish spots



Rhododendron 'Songbird' — (russatum x 'Blue Tit') 3', -20°C or hardier, E-EM, 3-4/4. There are many small "blue" rhododendrons, sometimes so many it is hard to separate them all. However, this one will stand out for its bright purple-blue flowers which seem to glow as if by some mystical power. The foliage is glossy green and makes a superb compact plant



Rhododendron 'Nancy Evans' — ('Hotei' x 'Lem's Cameo') 3', -15°C, M, 5/4. Take a look at this plant's parents, and it goes without saying that it must be a wonderful rhododendron. Shining, golden-yellow flowers combine with good foliage to produce a magnificent plant. It is simply excellent and it flowers young, so you won't have to wait forever for your reward.

Rhododendron Species Project at Milner Gardens & Woodland.

A collection of species rhododendrons will be established at Milner. The five chapters of the ARS on Vancouver Island have pledged \$20,000 to the project which will be matched by Milner Gardens. This idea was promoted by the late Harry Wright of the North Island Chapter in the 1990s and is finally being realized as resources become available.

An advisory board has been created with representatives from each of the five chapters and from the Milner Gardens and Woodland Society.

Jim Cadwaldr, a landscape architect and formerly the executive director of the gardens, has donated his time to produce a landscape plan. He has been working with Wilfred Worland, a retired architect & Milner volunteer, Geoff Ball, the executive director, Pamela Murray, the lead interpretive guide at Milner, Art Lightburn and John England of MARS.

Approximately 5/8 of an acre has been designated for the project behind the gift shop and reflecting pool. A plan has been prepared for layout of entrance/exit, paths, and tree removal/retention. Construction is expected to begin this fall.

Last week the plant selection committee of the advisory board met to review the final draft of the landscape plan. A holding area will be established to collect the plants and maintain them until they are large enough for planting out. Volunteers will be responsible for looking after them.

Criteria for selection of plants for the collection include rare or endangered species, parents of hybrids at Milner, geographical representatives, and companion plants.

Fundraising will also be a priority because more funds are needed to complete the project. Donations made to Milner Gardens and Woodland Society are tax deductible.

Getting to know each other...

This month, I am honored to introduce you to Jean Rhodes. Jean has been involved in the rhodo world for decades, first on the lower mainland and later on Gabriola Island. With her husband Bob, they developed a beautiful garden and a passion for rhododendrons including propagation and hybridizing. Thank you Jean for agreeing to be "spotlighted" this month.

1. How long have you been growing rhododendrons? I have been growing rhodos since 1958 and very intensely since 1969 when I married Bob Rhodes.

2. How long have you lived on Vancouver Island?

We bought our property on Gabriola in 1971 where we camped for 10 years as a break from looking after our 1,000 plant rhodo garden in Maple Ridge. While our house was being built and for 4 years, Bob made cuttings of all our



favorites (about 450), which we potted on to 1 gal. size and each time we came we brought some over and stashed them in a big damp sawdust pile. We moved to Gabriola permanently in 1988 and started our new garden.

3. Describe your best day in the garden. ©

My best day in the garden is when it is in reasonable shape and visitors come to share it.

4. What other interests do you have?

My other interests are music (classical, operatic, folk) – I sing in two choirs (church and Island Singers); photography; keeping track of a large family; and handcrafts.

5. Do you have a favourite rhododendron?

My favorite rhododendron is of course, R. "Jean's Favorite" a sky blue and white *augustinii*, but I like all the smaller varieties that go well in a rockery.

6. What do you like about the Nanaimo Rhododendron Society?

I like the N.R.S. because the group is friendly, and becoming more and more knowledgeable as everyone learns and shares.

7. Anything else you might like to share????

When Bob became ill with Parkinson's, I had to take over the entire garden as well as look after him, so the garden got neglected and quite a few plants died with Bob. Now I am interested in bringing it back. I shall be looking carefully at new rhodos when we have our spring plant sale!

Rhodos worth Growing

Rhododendron 'Cilpinense' — (ciliatum x moupinense) 3', -15°C, E, 3-4/3-4. What an attractive hybrid this is for both foliage and flower! The leaves are small to medium sized and are deep forest green. The flowers sparkle in the sunlight like big apple blossoms, a blush pink touched with deeper pink. Yes, this is beautiful!

Rhododendron 'Snow Lady' — (leucaspis x ciliatum) 30", -20°C, E, 3-4/4-5. An aptly named plant reminiscent of newly fallen snow. Soft fuzzy green leaves enhance the pale petal color dressing it up like a real 'lady'. Flowers well in deep shade. Much appreciated because it buds easily and blooms early.





Dorothee's Apple Cake Recipe

Peel 4 tart apples. Cut into 1/4s and take out core. Make incisions into top of quarters (but keep piece intact). Butter an 8 by 8 inch pan and preheat oven to 350° .

Dough:

Sift together
1 1/3 c flour
2 t baking powder
1/4 t salt
Cream until light and fluffy
1/4 c butter
Beat in gradually 3/4 c sugar
1/2 t vanilla
1 egg, well beaten

Stir in flour mix together with 1/4 c milk 3 T candied orange peel

Ladle dough into pan and push in apple 1/4s to make a pleasing pattern (I usually have 4 rows of 4 pieces) Put 1 t melted butter on each apple piece
Sprinkle 1 T brown sugar on each apple piece.

Bake for about 30 minutes until top is crispy/light brown.
