Pruning Rhododendrons

with Scott Wiskerke at Beban Park Social Center

Our Program for March: Pruning Rhododendrons with Scott Wiskerke

I took the Horticulture course at VIU in 1993 and have been pruning trees and shrubs ever since. First, I leased several local apple orchards, growing and selling apples at several Farmers Markets. Next, I purchased an acreage south of Nanaimo and started my own apple orchard for which I grafted 1400 trees. By 2004, I got out of the apple growing game and started *Roots and Shoots Horticulture* as a residential pruning service which I am still operating today. Through my years of pruning, I have developed a broad knowledge of pruning many of the trees, shrubs, and plants common to our local gardens and landscapes.

Rhododendron "Cynthia" in Ladysmith - the aftermath of the December storm (from our February 2019 newsletter)

Editor's note: A Look Back at Rhododendron "Cynthia" in Ladysmith. A pruning challenge taken on by our March speaker, Scott Wiskerke. At our meeting, he'll be showing us how to prune our rhododendrons (don't worry, they'll be smaller than "Cynthia"), with a follow-up demo at Hailey Grove at Bowen Park.

In 2017, Ladysmith's iconic rhododendron was listed as one of "the world's great trees" by the Bored Panda website.

Rhododendron "Cynthia" is thought to have been planted by George Fraser in 1878 and stood 9 meters high and 8 meters wide.

As we all know, we had a huge windstorm blow through the southern BC coast on December 20th. BC Hydro called it "the most damaging windstorm in their history".

Unfortunately, *Cynthia* (or "*Lady Cynthia*" as it has become known locally) was severely damaged by the windstorm.

Two of its three stems or trunks were broken at the base. It didn't take long before word of the damage spread. A CBC article soon followed:

In early January, members from various ARS Vancouver Island chapters met with the owner, Peter Richmond, to offer advice and to take cuttings – just in case... A second follow up visit was made on January 11th. The big question was how to save what was left, as the damage was pretty significant. The general consensus seems to be that severe pruning of the remaining stem will be necessary in order to take the strain off of the weakened plant. Otherwise, the next windstorm or heavy snow load could be fatal.

The Shadehouse and Nursery at Milner – an exciting update by John Deniseger

The shadehouse and nursery project at Milner is a partnership between Milner, the NRS and MARS, largely funded by a generous, anonymous donor. The intent is to create a shared space for “growing on” the hundreds of rooted cuttings created by our propagation team. Once they are well rooted, they will need to be “grown on” to saleable size for 2 to 3 years. By partnering, we’ll be able to access a wider range of plants for our cuttings, resulting in a wider range of rhodos for both club members and the public. Last summer, the 45' x 30' shadehouse was erected, the shadecloth netting was put into place and the compacted gravel base was added.

Over the winter, a compacted gravel road bed (about 150') was added for all season access to the area. The roughly 2500 ft² nursery area was also levelled and prepared with a compacted gravel base. The entire facility has now been surrounded with a 7-foot-high deer fence. The gates are under construction and will be added soon. Next steps will include the addition of a covered potting table/work area and automated irrigation system! **We're almost there!**

NRS Propagation Committee report – by Rosina Schmidt

Our 2022 cuttings are doing well, thanks to all that TLC by the Propagation Committee. The following liquid fertilizer concentration has been used recently: 20-8-20 mixed to a 150 ppm at an injection rate of 1 to 100. (3 kg per 40L tank). Another high calcium mixture will be spread later in the season: 15.5-0-0 mixed to a 150ppm at an injection rate of 1 to 100. (3.8 Kg per 40L tank).

The creation of the species garden at Milner is a partnership between the 5 Vancouver Island chapters of the ARS, Milner and Vancouver Island University. Believe it or not, we're coming up to the 5 year anniversary of the grand opening on April 18th, 2018. Since that time, we've continued to work on the garden by adding more rhododendrons and companion plants. We've also had work bees where we've added arborist mulch and done some light weeding. After 5 years, the garden has really matured and is looking great!



Planning for phase 2 of the species garden is underway, thanks to a significant donation and the collective efforts of many volunteers and Milner staff. Phase 2 will be in the area near and below the viewing platform. It will feature big leaf species and those that will grow into large specimens. Due to the slope of much of the area, substantial advance work needs to be completed before we can physically work on the site. In the meantime, we've begun the process of plant selection and acquisition. Stay tuned for more details in upcoming newsletters and at our meetings....

Over the winter, substantial work has been done on the creation of interpretative panels for the species gardens. Several members from both the NRS and MARS have worked with Milner staff to create something both creative and informative. The signage should be in place later this spring. Be sure to check it out! Looking ahead, we're planning a work bee for sometime in March as well as an exclusive open house for Island chapter members to celebrate our collective achievement in the creation of this very special garden.



March Gardening Calendar by Rosina T. Schmidt

- Do you remember?**
- When Forsythia is blooming – plant radishes.
 - When the apple trees and lilacs are blooming, plant squash, cucumber, and beans.
 - Wait for planting the tomatoes until the Spireas are blooming.

Rhododendron: still time to fertilize your young Rhodos, using 10-6-4, or 10-6-8.

Orchard Bees: set the cocoon outside for release when blooms are a week away.

General Gardening: Aerate and top-dress lawns; apply lawn fertilizer. Plant trees and shrubs. Start begonia tubers inside. Prune back roses and fertilize with a granular slow-release fertilizer.

Hailey Rhododendron Grove Work Bee ~ Bowen Park



Plant of the Month by Ron Sutton

Rhododendron 'Canby' (name changed to 'Starbursts'?)

Here is a wonderful rhododendron from the Frank Fujioka hybridization program. There is very little information available for it, but it does have R. Starbright Champagne as part of its genetics. The flowers are quite distinctive, with shell pink elongated petals, resting on dark green leaves.

In early to mid-May, it produces trusses of 9-10 flowers. Classed as a dwarf rhododendron, it will grow to approximately five feet high by 5 feet wide in 10 years. It likes full sun and is hardy to -18°C, USDA zone 7.

I purchased my plant in 2019 from Whitney gardens in Washington.

My plant, seen in the photo taken May 13, 2022, gets a great deal of full sun and grows well. Regarding the name, it was sold to me as R. 'Canby' but I have since learned the name is being changed to R. 'Starbursts'.

To my knowledge, it hasn't been registered yet. Definitely recommended if you can find one, whatever the name.

Sometimes they bloom, sometimes they don't - the challenge of the early bloomers! By John Deniseger

From early January through to February 22nd, we'd had a fairly mild stretch of weather, with only the occasional light frost. Our tender rhododendrons, which we keep in pots were on the verandah, looking great. Our early bloomers, such as R. 'Cilpinense', R. 'Snow Lady', R. *sutchuenense*, and R. 'Lee's Scarlett' were thriving, with buds that were beginning to open. R. 'Lees's Scarlett' had a number of trusses that were fully open, a real treat in mid-February. It looked like we were going to make it through February without a deep freeze. And then, it all changed...

With forecasts of snow and overnight temperatures potentially as low as -8, we decided to take some action. As a general rule, rhodo flowers and buds that are well advanced can only take a light frost, without turning into brown mush. First, we moved our tender rhodos to the garage. Here are some photos from the late afternoon of February 22nd.... Will it work? Probably not, but we felt like we had to at least try! Don't worry, the neighbours are used to it 😊

Nurseries in the Comox Valley

We got the following message from Naomi Chester, Vice-President of the North Island Rhododendron Society, with an update on valley nurseries.



- **GardenWorks** has had most of their rhodo delivery in now and it is much more exciting than it was the last few years at Art Knapps (there are a couple of Barlups, Lem's, species and many others that are not routinely seen around here). One-gallon rhodos are \$23 (azaleas \$17.99) and 3 gallon rhodos are \$62. Do say hello to Aleia, the nursery manager there, who is a dear friend of ours and relatively new member of our club.
- **Paradise Plants** on Hardy Road is now open for the season and are awaiting their rhodo delivery but have some beautiful large sized specimens currently in stock.
- **Outback Nursery** on Headquarters Road is opening March 1st and will be having a 25% off all last year's stock sale until the 7th. They have lots of rhodos available and there will be 6 varieties of Japanese maple included in the sale too (fertilizers, natural stone, new stock and soil amendments not included).
- **Anderton Nursery** is having construction done so is aiming to open sometime in the first 2 weeks of March.

From the BC Council of Garden Clubs – A new Zoom presentation on March 8th!




