

Request for Public Assistance April 2004

Camellia Recall Camellias from Monrovia Nursery, California Due to Potential Infection with Sudden Oak Death.

The Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) and the British Columbia Landscape and Nursery Association (BCLNA) are seeking the co-operation of the public in a recall of all Camellia plants originating from the Monrovia Nursery — a large nursery in California that exports plants to many garden centres and nurseries throughout Canada. This recall is due to the recent finding that some Camellias from Monrovia are infected with Sudden Oak Death (SOD). Please call the recall number below if: You purchased a Camellia between September 1, 2003, and March 2004, and you know it came from Monrovia Nursery (identifying features include green pots with the Monrovia name, or Monrovia plant tags). You have a Camellia plant and you do not know where it came from. You have a flowering plant and you are unsure if it is a Camellia. If you have a plant or plants identified or suspected to be a Monrovia Camellia, the CFIA and BCLNA will send a representative to your home to remove the plant(s). Please have ready the name of the garden centre where you bought the Camellia and the approximate purchase date.

DO NOT touch the plant. Leave it undisturbed in your garden. Suspect plants should be removed ONLY by qualified staff to prevent further spread of the disease. Plants can be tested only at an accredited laboratory. DO NOT take the plant or its leaves to a garden centre. If you have a suspect Camellia removed from your garden, you will receive a certificate that can be redeemed at a garden centre.

Although it is not a human health concern, SOD infects and kills many common urban and native plants and trees, including, but not limited to oak, maple, rhododendron, rose, and blueberry plants. YVONNE'S CHEESE STRAWS

1/2 lb. (250 g) all purpose flour 3 oz. (100 g) of margarine or butter 6 oz. (200 g) grated aged cheddar cheese salt/pepper and dry mustard Iced water to mix.

Preheat oven to 400° F Add salt/pepper and mustard to flour and mix well. Rub in margarine. Mixture must look like fine breadcrumbs. Add grated cheddar cheese and mix. Add sufficient iced water and mix with hands to form firm but pliable dough. Roll out on floured surface 1/4" thick. Cut into strips and baste with beaten egg or with egg mixture.

Bake in preheated oven at 400 degree F.

Gardening Hints & Tips by Jennifer Moore

Green worms on Roses - Pair garlic close to roses, you will lessen the number of green worms eating their leaves. Cut banana peels into 1 inch pieces and place at the base of the bush also helps.

Squirrel deterrents - Place animal or human hair with tulip bulbs to deter squirrels from eating them. Placing bone or blood meal with bulbs and on top of the soil will help as well. The best deterrent - Plant daffodils with tulips - The daffodil bulbs are poisonous to them, therefore they may dig them up but will leave them alone.

Cumin Powder vs Cayenne Pepper - Do not use cayenne pepper when deterring any pesky animals - studies have shown hummingbirds will have abnormal young after ingesting it and the animals in contact will harm themselves.

Dog/Cat deterrents - Moth balls or flakes or cumin powder spread along the ground. Don't use Coco mulch - they are attracted to the chocolate smell.

Mulch vs no Mulch - Mulch is the best weed deterrent - 4-6 inches of mulch is needed to ward off any seedlings that may sprout in your soil. Mulch also keeps the necessary moisture in too!

Deer deterrent - Place a half bar of Normal Irish Spring Soap into a pantyhose stocking and place it near where the deer enter your property. - They hate the smell!

Spidermite on Houseplants - Remove tobacco from a cigarette and mix it into the top of the soil - when watering it will leach into the soil and be absorbed by the plant, causing its leaves to taste horrible.

Planting Any Bulbs - Always plant in odd numbered clumps - a minimum of three is best. This prevents any "soldiers standing to attention" look!

Planting Potatoes - Potatoes should be planted in a ditch and as they grow fill in the ditch and keep mounding. The potatoes are formed along the stem and roots and the more growth the heavier the yield.

Planting Tomatoes - Tomato seedlings should be planted in a ditch on their sides. Simply remove all of the leaves except the top and lay the seedling on the side. Cover the roots and stem and leave the top "tuft" of leaves on top. The stem will grow roots and this will make the plant have a stronger and healthier root base - thus less watering and more tomatoes! To have a sweeter tomato, add a handful of Epson salts to the ditch, sprinkle lightly with soil then add your plant.

Watering should always be done in the early hours of the morning and water deeply (a long period of time) rather than sprinkling. The plants will go deeper to find the water and when a drought comes during the summer you won't need to water near so often.

Hanging baskets, windowboxes and containers - Place the contents of a new diaper into your soilless mix. The water-holding crystals will swell when you water and will release the

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moisture over time. This way you needn't water so often!

To help with mildew on roses, phlox and beebalm - mix a spray bottle with water, 1 tsp vegetable oil and 1 Tbsp baking soda. The soda will stick to the plant and stop any more spores from attacking the plant. The best solution is to make sure when you plant these plants - try to find varieties that are resistant and have a good air circulation available to them.

Ant, **Slugs and Flies** - In a plastic container mix together 2 Tbsp white sugar, 2 drops dish soap and then fill the remaining area with water. They are attracted to the sugar smell, fall into the container and the soap makes it slippery so they can't come out!

Blackspot and Mildew - Place chopped cat tails (horse tails) into a pail of water and let ferment for approximately 10 days. Strain and pour into a spray bottle - spray on your plants.

Attracting Beneficial Insects (Lady bugs and Praying Mantis) - Mix together 1/4 cup white sugar, 1 tsp honey, 1/3 cup warm water and 2 Tbsp yeast. Let rise for 10 minutes before using. Use 2 Tbsp to 2 cups water in a spray bottle and spray on plant leaves. Leftover mixture can be refrigerated for 3-4 days.

Attracting Earwigs, Slugs and Ants - Use the same mixture as above without diluting, and add 1 Tbsp oil. Place in garden where they are appearing - they will go to eat, only to fall in!

Rose Blackspot and Begonia Whitespot - Add 1 tsp Baking Soda into a spray bottle filled with water. Shake well and spray every 7-10 days.

Aphids Remedy - #1 In a blender place 1 garlic clove, 1 small onion, 1 Tbsp Cumin Powder and 1 liter water. Blend well, strain and pour into a spray bottle. Add 1-2 drops dish soap. Use!

#2 In a blender place 3-5 Jalapeno Peppers, 1 garlic clove, 1 liter water. Blend well, strain and pour into a spray bottle. Use every 7-10 days or as needed.

Sedum Propagation - Cut a stem from the main plant, remove the lower 2/3 leaves and place the remaining stem in moist soil. Keep moist for 2-3 weeks. You will notice new leaf growth at the sides starting to grow.

Hosta Propagation - No need to dig your entire plant into pieces! Simply remove the soil around the crown of the plant with your hands. The white part of the "rosette" will be seen. Cut this rosette as close to the base of the plant as possible. Place this cutting into water and it will grow roots after 8-12 weeks.

Walkways and Pathways - Always have a gentle curve if possible. It not only softens the line but is easy on the eye, easier to plant around or cut grass.

Tiering of plantings

In nature you will see many layers of plant material - The upper tier is tall trees, then below it is the secondary level of tall shrubs and short trees. The third level consists of tall perennials, short shrubs or vines on trellis'. Then the level of medium perennials and annuals and dwarf shrubbery. Lastly, is the groundcovers. This is the proper technique in planting your gardens where possible.
