They freely shared knowledge, plants and their wonderful garden with out members, to say nothing of Philip's almond cookies, peanut brittle, sticky buns and sausage rolls! We are grateful for all of this and wish them well in their new home.

They have a verbal agreement, which should have been formalized at this point (the owners had a deal on another property at the end of October, subject to this sale), to purchase a house next door to their son's place. This includes an acre or so around the house, and a treed slope going down to a ravine. There are trails to a creek, and the property borders on parkland, giving them a peaceful setting. heritage garden planted with many "rescued" plants is located in the park next door. This garden will most likely benefit greatly from the relocation of these generous gardeners. Any of us who have visited the Paull's know what kinds of marvellous plants have been given away as surplus! The new property now has just a few flower beds and an old greenhouse that needs replacing, so the landscape around the house will be largely a new canvas to work on. Anne and Royce Tennant are actually former members who have returned to the club. In 1998, they were traveling in New Zealand at renewal time and just didn't get around to coming back after their return. They are happy to be back, and Royce particularly looks forward to hearing some of the plant explorers speak about their travels. Anne has more general interests, and while she would like to learn more about rhododendrons, she is interested in all garden topics. They garden on a city lot, having come here from Ontario to retire 11 years ago. Gardening in this area has been a big change for them, coming from a ½ acre garden with beautiful loam and no deer to our milder climate, acid soil and plenty of hungry deer. Rhododendrons were a natural choice for landscaping, because of the deer and the acid soil, and many of the other plants that were nibbled too often by the deer have been replaced by rhododendrons. Anne and Royce have hybrids). They favour large, showy flowers on plants that are hardy and healthy, without too much fussing needed. Some favourites that have done well for them are: Hurricane, Pt. Defiance, Grace Seabrook, Fabia and Gartendirektor Rieger. While they do not have space for new plants, they occasionally need to replace less successful rhododendrons with new ones. Many of the rhodos in their landscape are mixed with other plantings, while some are planted as individual specimens. We welcome Royce and Anne back to the club.

2006 Rhododendron of the Year Awards Northwestern Region

Elepidote Rhododendron: 'Point Defiance' R. 'Anna' x R. 'Marinus Koster'

Flower white in center, edged purplish-red on all lobes, fading in time to nearly pure white, of heavy substance, widely funnel-shaped, 4-1/2" across. Buds are strong red colored. Held in trusses with 15 to 17 flowers. Blooms midseason. Leaves elliptic, mucronate apex, rounded base, 7-1/4" long, recurved edges, leathery, impressed mid-rib, dark green. Upright plant habit. Grows to a typical height of 6 ft. in 10 yrs. Cold hardy to -5°F (-21°C). Hybridized by Lem.

Lepidote Rhododendron: 'Wee Bee' R. 'Patricia' x R. *keiskei* 'Yaku Fairy'

Flower vivid red shading to pink in throat, red rays down each lobe, wavy lobes, openly funnel-shaped, 1-1/2" across. Held in lax trusses of 3-5 flowers. Blooms early midseason. Leaves elliptic, acute apex, cuneate base, 1-3/16" long, bronzy-red in fall. Rounded, dense, very compact habit. Low growing to a height of 1 ft. in 10 years. Plant is cold hardy to 5°F (-15°C). Hybridized by Berg. Won an Award of Excellence from the ARS in 1989.

Evergreen Azalea: 'Silver Sword' R. 'Girard's Rose' sport

Flower strong purplish-red, unmarked, openly funnel-shaped, wavy lobed, about 2" across. Dome-shaped inflorescence with 5-7 trusses, each 2-8 flowered. Blooms midseason. Leaves narrowly elliptic to elliptic, irregularly shaped, 1-1/2" to 2" long, glossy, sparsely hairy, variegated white and green, tinged red in fall, retained 2 years. Upright, broad, well-branched plant. Grows to a typical height of 2 ft in 10 yrs. Cold hardy to 0°F (-18°C). Discovered by Meivogel.

Deciduous Azalea: 'Washington State Centennial'

(R. occidentale x R. cumberlandense) x R. 'Santiam'

Flower light orange paling to white, with prominent strong orange-yellow blotch and discontinuous strong pink edge and veins, tubular funnel-shaped, very deeply ruffled edges, 3-1/2" across, fragrant. Ball-shaped truss holds 10-12 flowers. Blooms midseason. Leaves elliptic and narrowly obovate, apiculate, cuneate, 3-7/8" long, revolute, glossy, moderate yellow-green. Upright, open growth habit. Grows to a height of 5 ft. in 10 yrs. Hardy to -10°F (-23°C). Hybridized by Mossman. Selected by the Washington State Centennial Commission to honor 100 years of statehood.
