

Questions? ~An idea from our president...


Have you ever had a plant/gardening-related question and wondered how to get it answered... well, you have come to the right place.

With this photo report, it is our hope that you come to experience the Rhododendron Species Garden project at Milner Gardens as a worthy, long-term investment for our families and generations in the future. (Photos: Verna Buhler)

Following an introduction by John Deniseger, and the Treasurer's Report and Budget, committee members received an Update on Phase 1. Pam Murray presented a sample of signage for the Phase 1 area; temporary signage is in place and feedback was invited. Geoff explained the plans for benches, and that using different coloured wood chips, secondary pathways would soon be installed in the garden. Marilyn Dawson said that mulching bees would begin shortly to prepare the garden for winter.

Information on Phase 2, the Big Leaf Species Garden followed. Retired landscape architect and outdoor enthusiast, Jim Cadwaladr, made a lengthy and thorough presentation to the Advisory Committee. Using three large preliminary architectural landscape drawings, Jim explained the progress that he, a volunteer, and several geotechnical engineers had made since the committee's last meeting in February. He explained the results of the studies in terms of soil structure, degree of slope, drainage, and retention of the area that will be Phase 2 of the Greig Rhododendron Species Garden. Together with arborists, Jim and Geoff Ball identified and recorded the characteristics of each tree in the area, tagged trees that were weak, dying and dangerous for removal, and those that are considered special or specimen trees.





Following the indoor presentation, Jim led committee members through the Phase 2 area.








The entire Phase 2 area is very near the size of the Phase 1 area. Much of this area, however, is on the bank to the ocean; work will be done to build wattled "platforms" for planting the large leaf rhododendrons. Work on the large level section will begin first, with tree removal and minor clearing consistent with the Phase 1 section.

Special views of the ocean and beach will be preserved or enhanced.











It was moving to see the sparkle in Jim's eyes, as he asked quietly of a few of us who stood with him among the ferns and trees, "It's just beautiful, isn't it? I love the forests. And can you imagine?"

Jim is unquestionably the right person to design the garden.



History of the American Rhododendron Society

(Thanks to Chris Southwick for sharing this with us. Please click on underlined titles below for links to the various parts of the history.)

Part 1: History of the Founding the ARS and the major ARS Awards.

During World War II, the isolation of the US from plant societies in Great Britain caused interest to spike in the formation of a rhododendron society in America. Efforts on both the Pacific Coast and the Atlantic Coast led to the formation of the ARS in 1945. Award medals were presented to those that contributed the most to the Genus Rhododendron. Includes lists of ARS Past Presidents, Executive Secretaries, Executive Directors, and ARS Chapters.

Part 2: History of the ARS Publications and Plant Registration.

The lifeblood of any organization is its publications. The annual Yearbook started in 1945. The ARS Quarterly Bulletin started in 1947 and became the sole publication in 1950. Starting in 1957 the Bulletin began publishing the ARS Plant Registry. In 1982, the Bulletin became the Journal of the ARS.

Part 3: History of the ARS Test Gardens and Chapter Gardens.

The ARS wished to create it own rating system in the US rather than use that of the RHS. This led to the creation of the ARS National Test Garden in 1951 which became Crystal Springs Rhododendron Garden in Portland, Oregon, and two other ARS Test Gardens at the University of Washington and Morris Arboretum in Philadelphia. Soon there were many Chapter Gardens worldwide.

Part 4: History of the ARS Endowment Fund.

Several attempts were made over the years to form an Endowment Fund to insure the funding of office and publication expenses of the ARS. Finally, in 2000, after the Society received a \$320,000 bequest from Dr. John Swisher the fund generated significant income.

Part 5: History of the ARS Annual Conventions and Cut Flower Shows.

From the very beginning, rhododendron shows were very popular. The first Annual ARS Convention was in 1961 when the International Rhododendron Conference of 1961 was held in Portland, Oregon. Subsequently such conventions were held annually each spring and alternated between the east coast and the west coast.

Part 6: History of the Rhododendron Species Foundation.

The ARS Species Project which started in 1962, led to the formation of the Rhododendron Species Foundation in 1964, a non-ARS entity which was started by the ARS. Today the Rhododendron Species Foundation and Garden in Federal Way, WA, has over 700 species from around the world.

Part 7: History of the ARS Seed Exchange.

In 1963, the ARS Seed Exchange started under the supervision of Esther Berry. It has continued under the capable hands of a number of dedicated ARS members. It has grown to be global in scope and refined to the point of using traceable sources.

Part 8: History of the Rhododendron Research Foundation.

The ARS formed a Research Committee in 1970. This committee followed research that impacted rhododendrons and reported on it to ARS members. In 1975, the ARS Rhododendron Research Foundation was formed to fund research projects each year.

Part 9: History of the ARS Pollen Exchange.

Marthaann Mayer started the Pollen Bank in 1975 as a New York Chapter project. At the request of August Kehr, who was then president of the American Rhododendron Society, the chapter pollen bank became the ARS Pollen Bank.

An Update on our Activities at Milner

Shadehouse at Milner

As the weather turns to cooler and wetter, we're preparing the shadehouse for winter. We began by installing a substantial quantity of hardware to allow for the easy installation, removal and fastening of the plastic cover. The plastic was installed on October 11th by volunteers from MARS and the NRS. Next steps will be the construction of the end walls, 2 large doors (one in each end) and securing the plastic on the end walls. Once that is completed the shade cloth will be reinstalled over top of the plastic. We've set up a weekly maintenance schedule in cooperation with MARS members – we alternate weeks. Thank you to everyone who signed up to help out at the October meeting. We'll be holding an orientation session in late October. If you'd like to help out, please see John or Chris.



Plant of the Month by Ron Sutton

Rhododendron 'Loderi King George'

This is a hybrid cross between two species, *R. fortunei* and *R. griffithianum*. There are a total of 34 Loderi hybrids, but King George is the most well known. It grows into a tree size plant. Rate of growth is relatively fast, 6 to 8 feet tall in 10 years. On the Island, it blooms in early to mid-May, with loose trusses of 5 to 6 white flowers with a touch of pink, that are 4+ inches each in width. They are delightfully fragrant. It's hardy to -18°C and prefers part shade.

It's difficult to find, because it's difficult to propagate. The photo is of my young plant in bloom on May 10. I acquired my two plants from Perennial Ridge Farm. They however, no longer propagate rhododendrons.

(Ed. Note: there's a 10-to-12-foot specimen of Loderi King George just inside the main entrance of the Greig Rhododendron Species Garden at Milner. You may also come across R. 'Mrs. Josephine Firth' in your travels. It may simply be R. 'Loderi King George'.)

Rhododendron Glossary...



We're building our very own collection of terms related to rhododendrons, one word at a time. Each month, we'll add a new word or term to the glossary. If you have suggestions that you'd like us to add, please let us know.



This month's word is: senescence

Senescence is a normal process referring to rhododendron leaves turning completely yellow and dropping.

"Another reason that your rhododendron leaves may be yellowing is simply senescence or the aging and dropping of leaves. Leaves that are going through



this process will be entirely yellow. Senescence may occur during a heat wave, but we most often see senescence in action in the fall as trees drop their leaves and go dormant for the winter.... A few older leaves will still turn yellow and drop on occasion as the plant renews its foliage, so you shouldn't see a dramatic shift in the entire plant. If you do, you're dealing with chlorosis, not senescence"
