Margaret has authored several books including *In Veronica's Garden: The Social History of the Milner Gardens and Woodland*. A new, expanded edition of the Canadian best-seller was published in 2018. A graduate of UBC (Dip. Adult Ed, MA), Margaret's interests include garden history, life writing and memoir. Margaret lives in Langley with her husband Jim.



The Story of Darts Hill Garden Park

Darts Hill Garden is the result of over 70 years of work and dedication guided by the vision of Francisca Darts. Along with her husband Edwin, Francisca took a logged piece of land, turned it first into an award-winning orchard and then into the unique garden that is Darts Hill today. Her curiosity and love of the new and interesting has resulted in one of the most diverse collections of mature tree and shrub species in the Pacific Northwest. She became one of the most knowledgeable garden experts in western Canada. In 1994, Edwin and Francisca Darts donated their 7.5-acre garden to the City of Surrey. Their intention was to give Surrey its own garden, as a

horticultural center. Today, the non-profit Darts Hill Garden Conservancy Trust Society works in partnership with the City of Surrey.



Rhododendron Propagating Program ~ Part 1 by Ron Sutton



We were shown a long bench with undermounted hydronic heating of which 10 linear feet has been allocated for our club's use. The growing medium of perlite and sphagnum peat moss will be supplied by VIU and purchased by the club.

The rhododendron cuttings, which are best taken now through autumn, will come from members gardens and other sources such as public gardens, with permission.



Some of the attending

members of the group have experience with propagating.

We will return as early as Monday September 23, to set up and begin the propagating with some cuttings.





At the last executive meeting, the club executive proposed a rhododendron propagating program with the purpose of growing plants for members and the annual plant sale, the proceeds from which will boost the club's revenue. It was suggested that Vancouver Island University could assist with this plan.

On Tuesday, September 17th, 12 members of the Nanaimo chapter visited Vancouver Island University G. R. Paine Horticultural Centre. We were greeted by Christine Quist, an Instructional Assistant at VIU and a certified Production Horticulturalist. She gave us a short tour and explained what they do there.



Propagation – Part 2 ~ also by Ron Sutton

The first propagation session on Monday, September 23rd went well.



We had a good turnout of 11 members, who all pitched in to help get our fledgling project started. Some members brought cuttings of their own, but the bulk of cuttings were sourced from Chris Southwick and Ken Gibson's plants. The source initials were



placed beside the plant names in our log book.

Some supplies such as rooting hormone, tools, tags, trays were supplied by various members. We were given a tutorial by Allan Murray and Rheinhold Gorgosilich on how to prepare the cuttings. It took 3 hours to get all of the approximately 380 cuttings into trays planted, which are comprised mostly of

hybrids and a few species.

Raffle Plants:

R. 'Only Yours'

Good dark green foliage and large ruffled flowers of peach pink colour, shading to light pink with an orangy red throat. 'Only Yours' makes a stunning presentation in the garden as it has large very dark-green leaves on a very lush and full plant. This is a hybrid from the master hybridizer Jim Barlup of Bellevue, Washington. The blooms appear in mid-April and the plant will only be 3-4 ft tall and wide in 10 years.





R. 'Brocade'

'Brocade' is a hybrid of *R. williamsianum*. It and a related *R. williamsianum* hybrid, 'Bow Bells,' were developed in England in 1934 by Lionel de Rothschild, and registered in 1958. They have beautiful heart-shaped foliage that emerges copper, and then ages to green. Their April flowers are bell-shaped and held in loose clusters. With their compact, dome-shaped habit (about 3 ft. tall in 10 years) and elegant beauty, they make excellent plants for small urban gardens.

R. 'Brigitte'

'Brigitte' is a compact and very bushy growing rhododendron. It has attractive, evergreen, glossy long and narrow leaves. Flowers are beautiful and burst out late in the season from pink buds into white flowers with rich pink overlay at the margins and golden yellow throat. The shrub grows slowly making a cushion-like bush about 1 m tall and 1.3 m wide in 10 years. Hybridized by Hans Hoffman in 1980. Very hardy to a minimum of -27°C, possibly more.
