Hi Everyone,

The mild spring weather continues, but frequently too wet to get anything done in the garden. I know that many of us have plants blooming right now. I received my first mosquito bite of the year, no doubt one of many to come. I saw my first Rufous Hummingbird of the season on March 25, and bird song now fills the air.

We had a good turnout of 35 people at our last meeting to listen to a talk by Susan Zaric, a gardener for the city of Nanaimo. She told us about the projects her and her crew work on and the challenges they deal with.

Our Program for April - "Finnerty Gardens" - with Garth Wedemire

Join Garth Wedemire as he highlights some of his favourite rhododendrons in this photographic tour of Finnerty Gardens in Victoria. Finnerty boasts more than 200 rhododendron species – some exceeding 6 metres in height – making it one of the best collections of rhododendrons in Canada. For the past 50 years, the original rhododendron collection of Lake Cowichan's George and Suzanne Simpson has been augmented and curated to include companion plants, a woodland pond, a stream and over 19 delightful garden beds. On April 11th, come along for an armchair view of Finnerty through the eyes of Garth Wedemire. You just might be inspired to take your own – in-person – springtime tour of Finnerty.



For almost 50 years, Garth Wedemire has been a member of the American
Rhododendron Society and a great admirer of the genus Rhododendron. He is on the board of directors of the Rhododendron Species Botanical Garden and has travelled in Nepal and China on RSBG sponsored trips.

Garth received his first of 3 bronze medals from the Vancouver chapter in 1989, followed by medals from the Fraser Valley (2001) and North Island (2019) chapters. When he received the ARS Silver Medal in 2013, the following words were used to describe his many contributions:

"You have faithfully served the Chapters of District 1 and represented the interests of the American Rhododendron Society to a standard of excellence for more than 35 years. By using your many talents, you have been a soothing teacher, an aesthetic photographer, a masterful propagator, and a rational philosopher. You have been able to convey your ideas with a quiet and peaceful humility. Your webmaster abilities, photographic expertise, and your grace of lecturing have been invaluable to the Chapters in District 1. Our members feel both grateful and fortunate to have been the benefactors of your multifaceted talent. For your many contributions and your outstanding service, the American Rhododendron Society is pleased to award the Silver Medal to Garth Wedemire."

Garth currently lives in Langley with his wife, Sue. He remains a curious and ardent follower of all things botanical!

Gift Basket for the ARS Conference:




your gardening gloves, and a snack. The City will provide gardening tools.

An Update on our Activities at Milner

Greig Rhododendron Species Garden

Phase 1 of the GRSG (Greig Rhododendron Species Garden) continues to flourish. There's so much bursting into bloom as the days lengthen and warm up. We're also planning our first weeding work bee of the spring on April 2nd at 9 am. It's a great opportunity to spend time with other gardeners in a beautiful setting. You just never know what you'll learn or who you'll meet from other clubs.

Planning and preparation for phase 2 of the GRSG continues to move forward. At the Advisory Group meeting on March 19th, a number of items were discussed including: the initial arborist's work on the upper section; plant selection and approach; plant acquisition; slope stability and experimentation of "wattling" on the slope below the viewing platform. We may be able to begin planting the upper section as soon as this fall!

Longmeadow Shadehouse at Milner

In early April, the shadehouse will be prepared for the spring thru fall seasons. Over the winter, we were trying to keep the warmth in, now we shift to keeping the heat out. We'll put the shadecloth over the structure, roll up the lower 5 feet or so of the sides, open the doors and turn the irrigation on.

We've set up a weekly maintenance schedule in cooperation with MARS members – we alternate weeks. When we put out the call for the summer, the roster filled in a few days. Thank you to everyone who signed up to help out. You guys are awesome! If you'd like to join the team, please see John or Chris.


The Anticipation of Spring...

Plant of the Month by Ron Sutton

Rhododendron grande

I chose this **potted** plant because it is blooming right now for me, and it's the first time I'm seeing it do that. I had protected it in an unheated garage during freezing temperatures this winter.

It is a 2-foot-high plant that has been very slow to open its bloom buds - the cool temperatures having something to do with that.

Classified as a big-leaf species rhododendron, the leaves on my plant are not as big as they will be, given that my plant is young and small right now.

Rhododendron grande, belongs to section Ponticum, subsection Grandia, and is a tender species, hardy to only -12°C. It is native to regions of Nepal, Sikkim and Bhutan at elevations of 2500 to 3000 metres. The large leaves are medium green with a textured surface, and elliptic in shape with off-white indumentum. The creamy white campanulate flowers with dark purple nectar pouches form dense trusses of 15 to 25 flowers. It will grow to eventual tree size of 30 feet, in part shade and optimal conditions.

March 2024 ARS District #1 talk: Ludlow and Sherriff plant expeditions 1930-40 Presented by Ken Cox



Rhododendron Glossary...



We're building our very own collection of terms related to rhododendrons, one word at a time. Each month, we'll add a new word or term to the glossary. If you have suggestions that you'd like us to add, please let us know.

This month's words are: Calyx and sepal

Sepal: any of the outer parts of a flower that enclose and protect the unopened flower bud. The sepals on a flower are collectively referred to as the calyx. They are sterile floral parts and may be either green or leaflike or composed of petal-like tissue. (from Brittanica.com)
